Is University for Me (Social Sciences) – Session Plan

Overview: This session will introduce students to University/Higher Education study. We will explore some common myths around what university is, and who it is for, whilst also considering the various routes into HE.

Lastly, students will be introduced to the Social Sciences, exploring some of the core ideas within Psychology and Criminology. This session encourages participants to challenge their preconceived ideas around HE and accessibility.
